## Former student's inspirational award

Following her gold medal win in the KL2 canoe race at this year's Tokyo Paralympics, former All Saints' student Charlotte Henshaw, has been back in Mansfield inspiring the next generation of children.

Charlotte, who attended both St Patrick's and All Saints' in Mansfield,

visited both schools to talk to current students about the importance of working hard to achieve your ambitions. She previously won silver at London 2012 and bronze at Rio 2016 in the 100m breaststroke.

Supporting Charlotte was Mansfield Mayor Andy Abrahams, who surprised

her by presenting a shield named The Charlotte Henshaw Award – a new annual award to recognise pupil achievement at St Patrick's and All Saints' schools.

Charlotte's next challenge will be the 2022 World Championships and has her sights set on Paris 2024.

## One Kind Word: Celebrating individuality



To mark the start of Anti-Bullying Week 2021, thousands of pupils in our schools took part in Odd Socks Day. By wearing different socks, pupils were encouraged to celebrate individuality.
