End of Key Stage Results



- Children are tested in Reading, Grammar, Spelling and Maths.
- Although children are no longer given levels, the standardised score from these tests are sub-divided into:
 - Not at National Standard (working towards)
 - At National Standard (expected)
 - Working at greater depth



SATs week

 - Paper 3: Reasoning 2 (40 mins)



Reading



- It is a one hour test.
- There are 50 marks available.
- Last year, children who were classed as meeting National Expectation needed to score a minimum of 28. Greater depth was awarded to children scoring in excess of 40 marks.
- Last year's reading test contained 2,106 words. (1488 in 2018)



Reading



- There are three texts which increase in demand and difficulty.
- Some questions require one word or a brief answer. More complex questions (often worth 3 marks) require a more detailed response with direct references to the text.



Reading



The paper will test the following skills:

- Explaining the meaning of words
- Retrieving information
- Summarising
- Predicting
- Comparing
- Explaining how meaning is enhanced by the choice of words or phrases
- Inference and deduction





Punctuation and Grammar (Paper I)

- It is a 45 minute test.
- Made up of 50 questions which get progressively harder.
- Answers are either multiple choice or given as a short written response.





Punctuation and Grammar (Paper I)

Your child will need to be able to understand and use the following terminology:

- Preposition
- Tenses: simple, progressive ('to be' + -ing) and perfect ('to have' + past tense)
- Pronoun
- Punctuation: Apostrophe, colon, semi-colon, bracket, hyphen, dash
- Prefix, suffix
- Main clause, subordinate clause, relative clause
- Synonyms, antonyms
- Active voice, passive voice
- Conjunctions
- Modal verbs
- Determiners
- Subjunctive





Spelling (Paper 2)

- This is a separate test.
- 20 sentences are read out to the children. Children fill in the missing word, attempting to spell the words correctly.
- There are 20 marks available.





- The marks from paper I (punctuation and grammar) and paper 2 (spelling) are added together to give an overall SPaG total.
- Last year, children achieving 36/70 were classed as meeting National Expectation. Children getting 55/70 were considered to be working at greater depth.
- Spelling is key to enable children to achieve greater depth.



Writing



- Writing is assessed by the class teachers over the course of the year.
- Punctuation is key to achieving both National Expectation and greater depth.
- Children who do not consistently use basic punctuation correctly cannot even be awarded working towards National Expectation.
- Children who do not join their writing can not be awarded National Expectation



Maths



There are three tests which take place over two days:

- Paper one Arithmetic (30 mins, 40 marks available)
- Papers two and three reasoning (40 mins, 35 marks each)
- There is a total of 110 marks available.

Last year:

- Children achieving 56 marks, or more, were awarded National Expectation.
- Children needed to get in excess of 94 marks to be classed as working at greater depth.



Maths – Arithmetic (Paper I)



- 36 questions to answer in the 30 minutes.
- In order to finish the paper in the given time, children need to quickly choose the appropriate strategy to answer each question.
- This will not always be a written method.

Strategies in class:

- Daily arithmetic groups
- Weekly arithmetic tests
- Times Tables practice



Maths – Reasoning (Paper 2 and 3)



- Each paper is 40 mins long
- Papers two and three are word problems in a range of contexts, e.g. shape, timetables, fractions, money etc.,
- They are classed as reasoning papers as the children need to think carefully about the steps needed to successfully answer the questions.
- Some questions require children to explain their thinking.



A plea



- Please do not show your children any of the previous SATs papers (from 2016 onwards) which are available online.
- We will use these papers over the year to assess children's progress and identify gaps in knowledge.
- If children have already seen these papers, any assessment results based on these will be inaccurate and will therefore not provide a true picture of your child's needs.



Support



- Reading as much and as widely as possible (including non-fiction), chance to read aloud daily and answering questions to check understanding.
- Weekly homework handed in each Monday and has focused activities for each SATs paper
- Intervention groups and I:I interventions
- CGP books to be provided by school
- Regular times tables practice Y6 children should have instant recall of times tables (I-I2x)
- Websites PurpleMash, TTRS, BBC bitesize, SPAG.com

All the above should fit into one suitcase or large bag.



Medication



We understand that some pupils take medication on a daily basis and some pupils need medication on the odd occasion (e.g. hay fever, headaches).

Nearer the time of the residential, we will send medical forms home with the pupils to be completed if they require medication.

We will ask those pupils who take medication to come into school earlier on the day that we leave to hand over the medication with any information needed.
