Music development plan summary: St Patrick's, A Voluntary Academy

This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents/carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

Our music lessons are carried out by the OLOL Music Service on a Wednesday. Key Stage 1 (KS1) children receive a half an hour lesson each week and Key Stage 2 (KS2) children receive an hour. The music lessons offered allow all children the opportunity to perform, listen to, review and evaluate music across a range of historical periods, genres, styles and traditions, including the works of the great composers and musicians. Although it is a thread throughout our music lessons at St. Patrick's, a key focus for our FS and KS1 children is to learn to sing and to use their voices to create and compose music on their own and as an ensemble. They also have many opportunities to explore different instruments and begin to learn notation. Our pupils in KS2 use the foundations taught in earlier year groups to develop their knowledge further and to aid them in becoming a confident musician, both theoretically and practically as a performer. To encourage our pupils to practice and further develop their skills and understanding, we do offer the use of instruments at home, should a child want to.

Our curriculum is designed to allow our pupils to understand and explore how music is created, produced and communicated, including through the inter-related dimensions: pitch, duration, dynamics, tempo, timbre, texture, structure and appropriate musical notations.

At St. Patrick's, there is a huge emphasis on music and the importance of it becoming a cross-curricular subject that can be threaded throughout our curriculum. We pride ourselves on being a school that sees music not only as a standalone lesson, but as an opportunity to develop our pupils' knowledge of different cultures, developing their language skills, their motor skills and working as a part of a team. Music also positively impacts our emotional health and well-being and can become a tool to support self-regulation. Our music curriculum is appropriately adapted to suit the needs of individual pupils and therefore enabling an environment where all children can thrive and succeed, regardless of their individual needs.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

As well as whole class music lessons, we also offer individual and group instrumental lessons. Children have a range of instruments to choose from, including: brass, woodwind, percussion, strings, piano and voice. These lessons are taught by OLOL teachers. Our pupils have opportunities to perform skills taught within these lessons during our annual Pat Fest concert and our Arts concerts that are held throughout the year. Children are offered the opportunity to take the ABRSM exams and are fully supported by their teacher, should they want to explore this route. Pupil premium children are offered subsidised/free music tuition should they want to develop a particular musical instrument outside of whole class lessons.

In addition to this, we have our school choir, Years 3, 4, 5 and 6, who rehearse every Thursday. The choir are involved in numerous concerts both in school and the local/wider community, including a local nursing home, Young Voices and Nativities and carol concerts. As a Catholic school, hymn practices, worship time and Mass are at the centre of all that we do; the school choir lead our school community in masses throughout the year. There are opportunities for children to develop their love of performing by singing solo and as part of an ensemble during concerts.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Our school choir will be taking part in Young Voices January 2026, an excellent opportunity to experience a live performance, as well as singing with lots of other schools from around the country.

Our school choir take a lead role in masses, hymn practices, Liturgies, concerts, nativities and their own concerts on a termly basis.

Each term we hold an assembly which showcases our children's talents from across the Arts. This heavily involves music and choir. Pupils are given the opportunity to perform all that they've been learning during their individual/group lessons as well as whole class music lessons. In addition to this, we hold an annual Pat Fest concert, where all of the year's learning comes together as a huge concert to demonstrate to parents/carers and our wider school community the progression from Foundation Stage, all the way up to Year 6. This concert also includes individual performances, duets, trios and ensembles.

We have links with our feeder Secondary School, All Saints, who come throughout the year to perform their theatrical performances to the staff and children. Our Y5/Y6 children take part in music workshops at All Saints secondary school and are due to play a supporting role in the choir during their performance of Joseph and the technicolour dream coat this year.

In the future
